HISTORY OF THE ROBERT E. WEBBER INSTITUTE FOR WORSHIP STUDIES

The Institute for Worship Studies was conceived in the early 1990s by Robert Webber. The goal from the beginning was to offer academic courses to train pastors, music ministers, worship leaders, theologians, church leaders and lay people to understand and practice worship renewal.

In the mid-nineties, two programs were begun in conjunction with established seminaries. A program of studies leading toward the Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) was begun in connection with Northern Baptist Seminary in Lombard, Illinois. At the same time a Master of Theological Studies (M.T.S.) in worship studies was established at Tyndale Seminary in Toronto, Canada.

Numerous applications were made to Northern by music ministers and worship leaders who had completed their master's degrees in music, but wanted doctorates in worship studies. Because a Master of Divinity was required for entrance into the D.Min. program, these students were rejected for graduate study.

It was Robert Webber's conviction that there should be a doctoral program of worship study with wider admission standards. This degree should teach worship from a biblical, historical, theological and cultural perspective without requiring a theological master's degree or its equivalent.

James Hart, then Minister of Music at Grace Episcopal Church, Orange Park, Florida, in 1999 committed the use of their church campus for the school. Hart made the appropriate connections in the state of Florida, and the Institute for Worship Studies was established as an authorized non-profit school in the state of Florida with assistance through membership in the Florida Council of Private Colleges, a state-approved educational association.

The Institute for Worship Studies opened with its first class of twenty doctoral students in June of 1999. The Master of Worship Studies program began in 2002. Robert Webber died April 27, 2007, after an eight-month illness. In January 2007, the Board of Trustees unanimously voted to change the name of IWS to the Robert E. Webber Institute for Worship Studies in honor of the vision, accomplishments, and contributions of Robert Webber.

Since its founding, IWS has grown steadily and matriculates an average of fifty-seven new students a year. As a result of this growth, IWS moved to the campus of Hendricks Avenue Baptist Church in October of 2015.

The institute embraces and serves the whole church in its many expressions and variations of the Christian faith. Students have come from nearly every state in the US and more than thirty other countries.

The Robert E. Webber Institute for Worship Studies holds accredited status with the Commission on Accreditation of the Association for Biblical Higher Education. Accredited status was granted in 2010 and reaffirmed in 2015.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Patterned from medieval university customs, today's academic regalia reflect the status, scholastic achievement, and study discipline of the wearer. Colors are associated with different disciplines as seen in the trimmings of doctoral gowns and the edging of their hoods.

The array of colors evident at IWS is traditional, including white for the arts and humanities, brown for the fine arts, light blue for education, red for theology and pink for music.

Masters gowns have long chiseled sleeves with a slit near the upper part of the arm. Doctoral gowns have three velvet stripes on the upper sleeves and velvet on the front panel.

Hoods are worn by those earning or holding graduate degrees. The doctoral hood is longer than the masters hood. The colors on the back inside of the hood are always the official colors of the school. In IWS's case, the colors are crimson and gold. The velvet edging on the hood is red, the color of the discipline of theology.

Faculty members holding degrees from other institutions of higher education will wear regalia with colors of their alma maters and their academic disciplines.

ABOUT THE IWS COMMENCEMENT SERVICE

The liturgy in use this afternoon is compiled and adapted from several ancient sources, and conforms to the historic four-fold order: God gathers, God speaks through the Scriptures, God invites our response at the Table, and God sends us out.

The Communion

The ministers receive the Sacrament, and then immediately deliver it to the People.

All baptized Christians are welcome at the Lord's Table.

There will be several Communion stations in the Sanctuary, and an usher will direct you to the proper place. First you will receive the consecrated bread, and then the wine. The chalice of regular wine will be nearest the minister serving bread; a chalice of alcohol-free wine will be next. Gluten-free wafers are available at any Communion station upon request.

Children whose parents do not want them to receive Communion, and others who for any reason do not wish to do so, are encouraged to come forward, cross their arms across their chests, to receive a prayer of blessing.

Prayer ministers are available on either side of the Sanctuary during Communion.

ENCHANTED WORSHIP

Sacramental Ontology and Christian Liturgy

WITH DR. HANS BOERSMA JUNE 18-19

This seminar will ground worship within a way of looking at the world that acknowledges the real presence of God in earthly realities. In worship we go up to heaven to join the angelic choirs, while heavenly realities become present here on earth.

We will ask how we can ground such assertions metaphysically. And we will turn in some detail to the two specific elements of sacramental worship that have always been regarded as central to Christian liturgy: Scripture and Eucharist. The seminar aims to contribute to a theology of worship that is grounded in a participatory outlook on life that re-enchants both the cosmos as a whole and our liturgical Sunday morning worship of the triune God.

Dr. Hans Boersma holds the J. I. Packer Chair in Theology at Regent College in Vancouver, British Columbia, where he teaches doctrinal theology and history of doctrine. Before going to Regent in 2005, he taught at Trinity Western University in Langley, BC (1999– 2005). He has also served as a pastor (1994–1998).

Dr. Boersma's interests range across a variety of areas: patristic theology, twentiethcentury Catholic thought, spiritual interpretation of Scripture, and Christian mysticism. In each of these areas, he is driven by a desire to retrieve the 'sacramental ontology' of the pre-modern tradition.
